AFSCME COUNCIL 5



HOUSE

1. <u>Presumptive Eligibility for Worker's Compensation extension (Final passage vote on HF 1203, pg. 7675,</u> 2/3/22):

This bill ensures certain high-risk, frontline workers who contracted COVID-19 through the course of their job duties, will have an easier time receiving Worker's Compensation benefits for the time they were unable to work due to quarantine. This law, which changes the burden of proof from the employee having to prove they contracted the virus from work versus the employer having to prove that the employee did not contract the virus at work, expired at the end of 2021. This was a vote to reinstate an expired law which helps protect workers.

A "YES" vote is scored as supporting the AFSCME Council 5 position.

2. <u>State Employee Contracts (Final passage vote on HF 3346, pg. 8582-8583, 3/28/22):</u>

This bill ratified the contracts for state employees that were agreed to in August of 2021. It was a clean ratification vote and did not attempt to make any changes to the contracts or insert the legislature into labor negotiations.

A "YES" vote is scored as supporting the AFSCME Council 5 position.

3. <u>Frontline Worker Pay (Final passage vote on SF 2677 as amended by the House, pg. 11182-11183,</u> <u>4/25/22):</u>

This bill included the full funding request for the Frontline Worker Pay program (\$1 billion) to pay for roughly \$1500 checks for every eligible frontline worker (an amount Senate GOP ultimately cut in half). This vote represents a reasonable compromise since it also included the funding to replenish the Unemployment Insurance Trust Fund.

A "YES" vote is scored as supporting the AFSCME Council 5 position.

4. <u>Omnibus Tax Bill (Final passage vote on HF 3669 as amended by the House, pg. 12692-12693, 5/4/22):</u> The omnibus tax bill prioritized taking a responsible approach to addressing the needs of working families, students, renters, and senior citizens. This bill would use approximately \$1.6 billion in the FY22-23 biennium and \$1.6 billion in the following two years to provide critical relief to people all over the state of Minnesota. The proposed changes included conforming income and corporate taxes to federal law, expanding the Renters' Credit, expanding the student loan tax credit, increasing the income threshold for the K12 education credit, creating a Great Start child care tax credit, expanding the Working Family Credit, and subtracting Social Security income for low- and middle-income retirees. The bill would also adjust the LGA and CPA formulas and increase funding by \$68 million and \$26 million per biennium, respectively.

5. <u>Commerce, Jobs and Economic Development Omnibus Bill (Final passage vote on SF 4091 as amended by the House, pg. 12991-12992, 5/4/22):</u>

This omnibus jobs bill prioritized investments in workers and families over tax cuts for corporations and the wealthy. Using supplemental funding from the state's budget surplus, this bill funded a statewide paid family and medical leave program that would provide all Minnesotans with up to 12 weeks of leave for a pregnancy and up to 12 weeks of leave for a serious health condition annually. This benefit would follow the participant, not the employer, so workers could change jobs without concern of losing their benefit.

1. <u>Frontline Worker Pay (Motion to Overrule the Ruling of Germaneness on the Murphy amendment to SF</u> 2677, pg. 5008, 2/14/22):

This amendment would have added the house language of the Frontline Worker Pay program to the bill that refills the Unemployment Insurance Trust Fund and reduces the payroll tax rate that employers pay to base levels. This amendment would spend \$1 billion to provide checks of \$1,500 to each eligible worker that met the criteria of a frontline worker.

The amendment was ruled out of order by the Senate President. A vote was taken challenging the ruling of the President in order to adopt this measure. A "NO" vote overturns the ruling of the President and a "YES" vote upholds the ruling of the President.

A "NO" vote is scored as supporting the AFSCME Council 5 position.

2. <u>Hourly School Worker Unemployment Insurance (Motion to Overrule the Ruling of Germaneness on the</u> <u>McEwen amendment to SF 2677, pg. 5010-5011, 2/14/22):</u>

This amendment would have allowed hourly school workers that do not require a license from the Professional Educator Licensing and Standards Board or the Board of School Administrators to access unemployment insurance between school terms, and would repeal the prohibition of these employees having access to unemployment insurance.

The amendment was ruled out of order by the Senate President. A vote was taken challenging the ruling of the President in order to adopt this measure. A "NO" vote overturns the ruling of the President and a "YES" vote upholds the ruling of the President.

A "NO" vote is scored as supporting the AFSCME Council 5 position.

3. <u>Third-Party Testing for Commercial Driver's Licenses (Amendment to HF 4293, pg. 7815, 5/2/22]</u>:

This amendment would remove the provision to permit truck driving schools to administer the knowledge and road exams for people pursuing a commercial driver's license. This provision would undermine the publicly-run Driver and Vehicle Services Division of the Department of Public Safety and shift the state towards a fully privatized model of regulating our roads, at the expense of both the safety of our roads and to our wallets. Third-party testing for CDLs would also prop up a training system for truck drivers that exploits trainees, which has turned long-haul trucking into among the most dangerous and underpaid professions in the country.

4. <u>Paid Family Medical Leave (Motion to Overrule the Ruling of Germaneness on the Kent amendment to</u> <u>SF 3885, pg. 8175-8176, 5/10/22):</u>

This amendment would delete the underlying bill and replaced it with the house language of the Paid Family and Medical Leave program. This amendment would create a statewide paid family and medical leave program that would provide all Minnesotans with up to 12 weeks of leave for a pregnancy and up to 12 weeks of leave for a serious health condition annually. This benefit would follow the participant, not the employer, so workers could change jobs without concern of losing their benefit.

The amendment was ruled out of order by the Senate President. A vote was taken challenging the ruling of the President in order to adopt this measure. A "NO" vote overturns the ruling of the President and a "YES" vote upholds the ruling of the President.

A "NO" vote is scored as supporting the AFSCME Council 5 position.

5. <u>State Employee Contracts (HF 3346, pg. 8613-8614, 5/20/22):</u>
