AFSCME mourns correctional brother

AFSCME correctional officers are remembering a fallen Oak Park Heights correctional brother, while making bold demands for safety on the job.

Corrections officer Joseph Parise rushed to help an officer who was being attacked by an inmate at OPH Monday. Parise, along with a MAPE care manager and others, stopped the attack and restrained the inmate. Then Parise helped bring him to segregation. Within 10 minutes, Parise collapsed. He was pronounced dead at Regions Hospital.

“We’re in mourning,” said AFSCME Council 5 associate director Tim Henderson, who led a press conference Tuesday with Oak Park Heights Local 915 president Jeff Vars and vice president Derek Magle, both OPH correctional officers. “You don’t go to work to die.”



“Joe was a friend, he was a brother, a father and a husband,” Magle said, adding Parise always put a smile on coworkers’ faces.

“We were all better to have known Joe as part of our brotherhood. Joe is going to be sorely missed.”

Parise and his wife have a toddler and a baby on the way. His death follows the July murder of CO Joseph Gomm by an inmate, and a year of increased assaults on staff.

AFSCME Council 5 and Local 915 leaders are demanding:

- The Legislature act to ensure adequate staffing to keep workers, institutions and communities safe.
- Changes to the segregation policy, including that inmates who assault staff face maximum penalties.

Hennepin County Locals Approve Contract

Six locals that bargain together, Locals 34, 552, 1719, 2822, 2864 and 2938 (legal unit) overwhelmingly approved their new contracts.



The City of Minneapolis is about to get even fiercer stewards: Jim Huntzicker, Robin Utto, David Bard (AFSCME field representative), Bruce Frame, Theresa Strong and Michael Goenner from Local 9 take part in training for new and experienced stewards.

The three-year contracts include raises of 2.5 percent in 2019, 2.5 percent in 2020 and 2 percent in 2021.

The contracts will standardize the step progression, which gave workers widely differing step increases and numbers of steps across job categories, and resulted in raises of less than 1 percent in some years. Now everyone in the range will get an additional 3 percent each year of the contract.

It will fix contract language that prohibited religious holiday use on Sundays; and expand funeral

leave for grieving. The locals also won important individual contract provisions such as a larger wage range adjustment for Local 1719 to help recruit new corrections officers.
