

AFSCME-Endorsed Candidates Win Primary Elections

AFSCME-endorsed candidates saw big success in primary races in Ramsey County and Duluth last week. On Tuesday, August 13, every AFSCME endorsed candidate on a primary ballot made it through to the general election in the fall.

At the top of the ballot was Duluth Mayor Emily Larson, who earned more than enough votes to move to the general election. Endorsed candidates for Duluth City Council At Large Arik Forsman and Noah Hobbs also earned enough votes to move forward.

A victory for the District 3 seat on the Duluth City Council was especially sweet, as union sister Theresa O'Halloran-Johnson advanced to the general election.

In Ramsey County District 1, AFSCMEendorsed Nicole Joy Frethem will take on Republican Randy Jessup in the fall. AFSCME members will remember Jessup as the anti-union House member who was defeated by DFL Rep. Kelly Moller in 2018.

In each of these races, AFSCME members knocked doors, made phone calls, and provided the ground game to propel our endorsed candidates to victory. But that work is far from over – with just 77 days between now and the 2019 general election, we need volunteers in all our endorsed races to make sure that leaders who support labor and public employees win in November. Local 638 (Sodexo) Ratifies Contract

Local 638 (Sodexo) voted to ratify a three-year contract that includes big wins for their members.

Highlights include a raise every year – by 2 percent in 2019, 2.5 percent in 2020 and 2.75 percent in 2021, pus an increase of \$0.75 - \$1.50 in starting wages for all classifications. The workers also won 15 minutes for New Member Orientation for new hires and an added Lead Employee Premium of \$1 into the contract.

In addition, members won meet and confer language for any changes that may occur as Sodexo transitions to new software. This will ensure that the union is involved if the changes impact vacation, sick, or holiday time.

Local 66 ISD 704 Bus Drivers Reach Tentative Agreement

Local 66 ISD 704 Bus Drivers reached a two-year agreement that includes a \$0.60 raise in the first year and \$0.65 in the second. The agreement also allows additional hours within the school district to bus drivers who want to work in food or custodial services.

In addition, the new contract increases personal leave days from three to five, an additional \$100 employer 403B contribution, improvements in language regarding transparency in tip distribution and posting of job vacancies, plus language that specifically includes bus drivers in the district's upcoming strategic planning initiative.
